

n behalf of the Georgia International and Maritime Trade Center Authority (GIMTCA), I express a sincere thanks to all the local cities (Garden City, Pooler, Port Wentworth, Savannah and Tybee Island) who extended their agreement with us to contribute 1 penny of the Hotel/Motel tax to support the convention center for the next 20 years. The Chatham County agreement is for 50 years. Additionally, we want to express our appreciation to Governor Nathan Deal, the Georgia State Representatives and Senators for approving \$3 million dollars to assist us in designing a much-needed expanded facility.


With this appropriation we will be able to start the design of a dynamic change to our facility which will increase our exhibit hall from 100k square feet to 200k square feet, add an additional 40k square foot ballroom, add additional meeting rooms, and add a parking deck. As stewards we are also moving forward in a partnership with a developer to support an additional 300 guest room hotel adjacent to the convention center. Both an expansion to our facility and development of a hotel adjacent to the convention center supports Governor Deal's efforts to ensure that Georgia remains the No.1 place in the country to do business.

Our goal is to be ONE with our community— to continue to be a community leader, to be a visionary, and to support and inspire future development and growth.

Hotel and Convention Center Expansion

o be dynamic requires being bold. Twenty years ago the idea of building a convention center on an abandoned island was bold. Today a rigorous expansion of the original building and adding an additional 300 rooms on the same island is bold.

In the early 1990s the leadership of Chatham County, the City of Savannah, and the Chamber of Commerce developed a vision for a world class convention facility in Chatham County. They had mutually determined that this project would stimulate our economy through construction spending, visitor spending, and job growth. Ultimately a partnership was developed among our local governments, the State of Georgia, the taxpayers of Chatham County, and the hotel community. The taxpayers were promised that if they would approve a SPLOST vote designating \$37 million (\$15 million added later) for the Convention Center, the State would contribute \$18 million and the hotel community would support an increase of 1% in the hotelmotel tax to fund the operating deficit of the building.

All partners performed as agreed and the Convention Center became a

reality in 2000. The first event was a reading conference held in February that year.

There have been additional SPLOST and State appropriations since 2000. We have finished the building, acquired additional land, extended the River Walk, created a water ferry service, and renovated and maintained the building.

To date the local community has supported the Georgia International and Maritime Trade Center campus in excess of \$150 million and the State has contributed more than \$41 million. Additionally we have secured Federal Grants, primarily to support the ferry system, in excess of \$11 million. Throughout the last 17 years, the Authority has fulfilled our promise that this project would not burden the local governments or taxpayers for operations and yearly capital improvements. Now we are facing an exciting challenge.

It is time to expand the building.

We have secured a self-funding hotel partner in the Songy Highroads group teamed with Omni Hotels and Resorts.

Since inception, the room base in Chatham County has grown from 8,000 rooms to 16,000 rooms. There are another 1,000 under construction and a 1,000+ in the pipeline. Several new properties are located in direct support of the Convention Center. We will soon have over 2,000 rooms either adjacent to or a short ferry ride away from the Convention Center.

It is time to expand the building

We have many customers who need more space and many prospective customers that cannot meet here because we are too small. We have conducted feasibility studies and they all indicate

We have engaged the architects, looked at seven different possibilities, and have determined that the attached layout is the most efficient and economical.

We look forward to engaging our community and the State of Georgia as we pursue the funding necessary to expand our building.

AUGUST 11 events 4,398 attendees



Next we hosted the Healthcare Convention and Exhibitors Association where both the Center and Visit Savannah Sales Teams were part of the Expo. The Georgia Bureau of Investigation/Georgia Crime Information Center Annual Training finished the busy month.

Honestly, as I evaluate the growth and challenges of SITCC's 2016-17 operating year, it has been nothing but dynamic, both in challenges and successes.

Hurricane Matthew brought damage to the facility, but we still hosted the Red Cross as they provided shelter for individuals and families who had been more severely impacted. As my mother used to say, "In every storm there is a sílver líning." From the storm winds of Matthew, a challenging time for Savannah, we hired 6 people who had been evacuees at the trade center. It feels good to provide neighbors temporary respite in times of emergency, but to be able to offer long term employment is a rewarding opportunity

The art community has also found a home in the Trade Center. Our vast expanses of blank walls have come to life with the artwork of local artists. Not only did we provide gallery space, we provided community events by hosting free artist showcases. Visitors to the center can enjoy the charm and uniqueness of the city as they are treated to the local cuisine and the artistic talents of our beautiful city.



OCTOBER 8 events 5,085 attendees

October opened with the American Institute of Architects who attended the 2016 South Atlantic Regional Conference. October 8th, the SITCC became a temporary shelter for evacuees who returned to Savannah following Hurricane Matthew. Coincidently and appropriate for the weather conditions at the time, the International Association of Emergency Managers met at the Center for their Annual Conference. Emergency managers from six countries attended the event. This was the first time the conference was held in Savannah, but they've agreed to return and host their 2019 and 2022 conference in Savannah regardless of the weather conditions.

The month ended with the American Association of Cereal Chemists returning to Savannah and the Trade & Convention Center for their 2016 meeting.

LEED Gold Certification

he quality of life in any community is the responsibility of all; SITCC is a leading steward in contributing to sustainable best practices in not only the City of Savannah, but also in the State

of Georgia. SITCC is the first convention center in Georgia to receive the LEED Gold (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) recognition from the U.S. Green Building Council.

The LEED certification rating system validates best sustainable practices already in place in a facility and focuses on improvement in other areas to increase energy efficiency and reduce carbon emissions. The overarching goal is a comprehensive approach to sustainability. To achieve this goal SITCC completed

an ASHRAE Level I Energy Audit to earn a building score of 60 points for an existing building; receiving Renewable Energy Certificates for 100% of energy

usage from wind power offsets; 41% percent of the building occupants using alternative


commuting options, and reducing
water consumption in the building by
32%. "Convention centers sometimes
have difficulty comparing operational
efficiencies due to the unique nature of
the industry--from event frequency to size
or type," said Tim Trefzer, LEED Accredited

Professional and Sustainability Manager. Although a daunting task as a community steward, SITCC took the challenge and once again became a local and state leader and model.



Be Stewards.

One of the displaced Savannah residents, she and seven of her family members had been evacuated to shelters in Augusta to escape Hurricane Matthew. Days later they returned to Savannah to await the "All Clear". While anxiously waiting to return to her home, BB Biggins observed the Red Cross Volunteers sweeping the exhibit hall floors, cleaning restrooms and other public areas. Not being one to sit by she volunteered to help. One day while cleaning, Thomas Hutchinson, Senior Operations Manager of SITCC, noticed her quality of work and asked her if she needed a job. "Yes!" She began working through a temporary staffing agency, was hired part-time in January and by June she became a full time Housekeeper. She is one of the many faces of SITCC who is an example of perseverance,

stewardship, and teamwork. She was also recognized by her peers and voted as the employee of the quarter in FY16.

JANUARY 18 events 35,673 attendees








APRIL 14 Events, 6,255 attendees



Skinmedica, Holtec International, and Polote Corporation Graduation Celebration wrapped up an exciting month at the center.




he Savannah Trade and Convention Center is a unique and memorable venue; it is located on Hutchinson Island across the river from Savannah's historic River Street. As a steward for many of the guests who attend conferences and exhibits at the SITCC, a water ferry is one of the memorable amenities offered. SITCC understands that many of the guests to Savannah lodge on the city-side of the river and often do not have access to convenient transportation; for theses guests the water ferry is the solution.

With 6,700 hours of service, 40,364 trips across the Savannah River, carrying an average of 99 passengers per hour, total ridership for 2016-17 was 665,162. The Marine Department's total budget was \$830,685 and ended the year under budget. The Marine Department was accident free and passed all Coast Guard inspections without any infractions and added a new landing dock near City Hall.
